Throughout February, KET will broadcast special programming to celebrate Black History Month including:

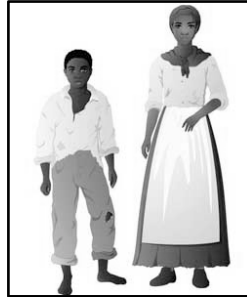
Slavery By Another Name explores the story of the post-Emancipation era and the labor practices and laws that effectively created a new form of slavery in the South that persisted well into the 20th century. *February 15 at 9/8 pm CT on KET.*

Freedom Riders: American Experience chronicles the journey that more than 400 black and white Americans risked their lives to take in 1961 to simply travel together on buses and trains in the Deep South. *February 15 at 9/8 pm CT on KET2.*

Underground Railroad: The William Still Story is the account of one of the most important yet unheralded individuals of the Underground Railroad. *February 6 at 9/8 pm CT on KET2.*

Daisy Bates: First Lady of Little Rock tells the story of her public support of nine black students to attend the all-white Central High School in Little Rock, Arkansas. *February 5 at 10/9 pm CT on KET2.*

MISSION US: Flight to Freedom



The newest installment of MISSION US launched in January. Mission two, "Flight to Freedom" promised to be popular with Kentucky teachers and students.

"Flight to Freedom" is set partly in Kentucky: the main character, Lucy, is a slave on a hemp plantation near Lexington. Her escape and subsequent involvement in the Underground

Railroad keeps Kentucky "on the map" throughout the game.

New on Teachers' Domain: Operation Preparation

KDE's Unbridled Learning: College/Career Readiness for All initiative is designed to ensure every student is prepared for college and/or career by the time they graduate from high school. Advising is a key strategy for reaching this goal, and as part of Operation Preparation trained volunteer community advisors will meet with every 8th and 10th grade student.

Log into KET Teachers' Domain to explore Kentucky's Unbridled Learning: Operation Preparation, two modules prepare community volunteers for their individual advising sessions. Module 1 provides an overview of the role of community volunteer advisors. Module 2 details the components of an advisory session.

Operation Preparation is a joint effort of KDE and the Department of Workforce Development and provides an opportunity for schools, students, parents and communities to collaborate in the process of effective advising and focus attention on the importance of planning for college/career.

Ten years after documenting the civil rights experiences of Kentucky African Americans in *Living the Story: The Civil Rights Movement in Kentucky*, KET revisits the pivotal players who organized with others to demand legal and social equality in *Kentucky Beyond the Color Line*.

Host Renee Shaw talks with activists that include: Blaine Hudson, dean of the College of Arts and Sciences at the University of Louisville; Lexington Urban League President P.G. Peeples; former State Senator Georgia Davis Powers; Louisville NAACP leader Raoul Cunningham; and John Johnson, executive director of the Kentucky Commission on Human Rights.
