Black bears, tiger swallowtails, tulip poplars, elk, and lungless salamanders are just a few of the species that thrive in this region. It is amazing to think there are living things all around us that have gone undetected, yet new species are continually being discovered in this mountain wonderland.

Thanksgiving & Native American Programs

BLOCK FEED #1 (taping rights: school year) (3 hours, 55 minutes long)

Grades Primary-8

Thursday, November 5 at 1:00 am/Midnight CT; Thursday, November 19 at 1:00 am/Midnight CT

America's Special Days Primary

Native American Day – We celebrate the contributions of Native Americans to our country's development, including their influence on the food we eat and the workings of our government. Successful Native Americans share their feelings about living in two cultures. (15 minutes)

Thanksgiving Day – The true meaning of Thanksgiving is emphasized as we observe past and present celebrations in a wide variety of cultural and ethnic settings. (15 minutes)

Teletales Primary *The Chenoo* (Native American) – Team warns his wife Mimku never to touch a leather pouch in their wigwam. When their little son Wasis shoots an arrow into the pouch, a terrible creature is released – a Chenoo. (15 minutes)

Kentucky's Story 4-5 *Early Kentucky* – Briefly reviews the arrival of prehistoric people on this continent and then focuses on the Indians living in Kentucky just prior to the coming of white settlers; looks at the homes, games, clothes, economy, and lifestyles of these tribes. (15 minutes)

Holiday Story Fun for Kids K-6 *Thanksgiving Stories* – Several stories highlight the themes associated with Thanksgiving – Native Americans, pilgrims, turkeys, and more. (40 minutes)

Old Music for New Ears Primary-8 *Dennis Banks* – Native American music “The Flip Side,” “A Forty Niner Song,” and “An Honor Song.” (15 minutes)

Dancing Threads: Community Dances From Africa to Zuni Primary-8 *Zuni Harvest Dances* – taught by Zuni storyteller Arden Kucate. Discussion topics: history of the Southwestern American Indians, daily life of the Pueblo peoples, similarities and differences among cultures. (30 minutes)

Telling Tales Primary-8

Little Deer and Mother Earth – A Cherokee tale with an environmental message, told by Marilou Awiakta. (15 minutes)

Rising Fawn and the Fire Mystery – A tale from Cherokee history, told by Marilou Awiakta. (15 minutes)

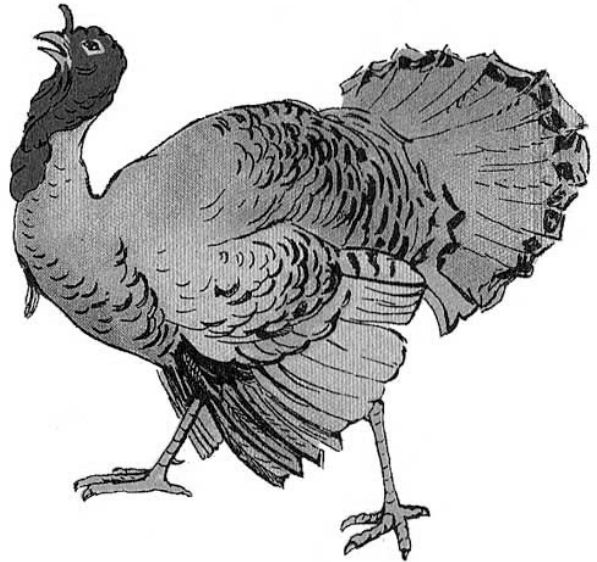

A Native Presence 4-12 This KET production documents the efforts of Native Americans in Kentucky to reconstruct their ancestors' history in the state through archaeological evidence as well as oral history and tradition. From the Shadows of the River 4-12 The Wickliffe Mounds near Murray have been at the center of a controversial and painful issue in Kentucky history – that of one person's archaeology being another's grave desecration. During the winter/spring of 1996, the mounds served as an inspiration for contemporary Native American artist Truman

Lowe, who created four works of art in response to what he saw and felt upon visiting this ancient Indian settlement on the bluffs overlooking the Mississippi River. He returned to create another work on-site with the help of school children from several Western Kentucky counties. (30 minutes)

Native American Series Upper Primary-5

Five hundred years ago, a wide variety of Native American peoples occupied all of the lands of North America. This series introduces students to some of those cultures by region. Through stunning live-action cinematography, each program shows the continuity of customs, culture, and history among the Native Americans of each region, helping students develop appreciation and understanding of this shared heritage. (1 hour, 40 minutes)

Kentucky Archaeology 7-12 This set of three short documentaries explores new research about Kentucky's rich cultural heritage. Produced by the Kentucky Heritage Council, each segment examines a unique aspect of archaeology with a blend of interviews, artifacts, rare archival images, and video of ancient Native American sites in Kentucky. (26 minutes)

The Short Story 7-12 *Two Thanksgiving Gentlemen* by O. Henry – Dramatized by professional actors and supported by striking costumes and vivid sets, this program introduces middle and senior high school students to the best American writers and compares their works with those of the best writers from other countries. (15 minutes)

Great Native American Leaders 3-8

Four of America's great Indian leaders, from some of the most famous Native American tribes, are portrayed here by historic photographs and graphics, dramatic reenactments, haunting music, and their own words. This revision of America's Great Indian Leaders focuses the series at the lower primary-middle school level. (54 minutes)

Great Native American Nations 3-8

Six of America's representative Indian nations from five major geographic areas of common Native American cultures are portrayed here by historic photographs and graphics, dramatic reenactments, music, and the people's own words. This revision of America's Great Indian Nations focuses the series at the primary-middle school levels. (1 hour, 1 minute)
