

Kentucky Life celebrates Mother's Day with spotlight on Henderson's HorseFeathers Gifts, Morehead's Bakery on Main and more

Kentucky Life honors Mother's Day with a special themed episode that captures the powerful bond between mothers and their children. The program airs Saturday, May 9 at 8/7 pm and Sunday, May 10 at 4/3 pm on KET and Monday, May 11 at 7/6 pm on KET2.

First, the program highlights the close friendship and business partnership of motherdaughter pair Tammy Morse and Chelsea Farmer of Henderson. Their business, HorseFeathers Gifts, offers one-of-a-kind handmade gifts and jewelry inspired by the rural landscape. Their extensive jewelry line – which includes bracelets, necklaces, rings and earrings – combines a vintage, heirloom look, but with a thoroughly modern style.

Then, *Kentucky Life* spotlights the Louisville-based Family Scholar House, a nonprofit that offers daycare services to single mothers (or fathers) to allow them to pursue and finish their college degrees. Across four campuses since its founding in 2008, Family Scholar House has hosted nearly 400 families in its residential programs, while serving more than 900 additional families via non-residential support services.

Next, the show sheds light on a little-known story of Kentucky women's bravery during the Revolutionary War. In the waning days of the war, the fortified settlement of Bryan Station found itself under siege from Shawnee Indians and British Canadians. In a risky but bold step, women from the fort ventured outside the fort's walls to glean much-needed water from a nearby spring – all while avoiding the would-be captors, who were concealed in the forest, and at the same time not letting on that they knew they were there.

Finally, the program travels to Morehead to visit the Bishop Family, where siblings Kelly and Paul Bishop run The Bakery on Main right next door to their family's restaurant, Pasquale's Diner, a staple in downtown Morehead for more than two decades. Kelly and Paul's mother, Jan Bishop – who runs Pasquale's with their father, Tom – encouraged her children's interest in the culinary arts as they were growing up and now is on hand to

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offer motherly advice, whether about the bakery business or life in general, any time they need it.
